He used the money from these jobs to open a restaurant/cafe which also had the areas only swimming pool offered to African Americans. He later built and opened Mountain Laurel Motel, Forest Hill Lake Recreational Center, and the 6 Spot Cafe. Although Mr. Simpkins was successful in all of his business ventures, he felt something was missing in his life. He received a calling from God and then built and ministered at St. John's Holiness Temple.
